The impact of climate change

Around the world, climate change is having a profound impact on vulnerable communities.

Communities around the world are discovering that life is not how it used to be. The way that they've lived and worked throughout generations is no longer possible. They know that something needs to be done.

Our world is changing due to the climate crisis. Once regular and predictable rains no longer come. Instead, communities around the world face weather extremes such as drought, storms, and floods. This the new reality for many of our global neighbours, and Christian Aid, along with its partners, are working to support communities across the globe in adapting to changing conditions.

One such community is that of Angela's in Nicaragua. Here is her story:

Today the little coffee farm is a hive of industry with workers coming from the

surrounding communities to help pick the coffee beans. It is a scene that has repeated itself for generations across the coffee growing region surrounding Santa Rosa, two hours drive up in the mountains from Jinotega in Nicaragua. Angela is in the kitchen preparing the food for the workers and her family.

When she emerges with plates of vegetables, beans and rice she tells me about the pile of blackened, charred coffee beans discarded in the corner; "The sun has scorched the beans; we cannot sell them and we're losing more every year because of climate change."

As temperatures rise and the weather becomes increasingly unpredictable, will Angela be the last generation to harvest coffee in this beautiful but vulnerable corner of central America?

"With climate change in the next 10-15 years, the coffee yields will decrease and other disease will show up. With these weather changes that we're seeing, we don't know what's happening. If we don't do anything to stop it, it'll go from bad to worse."

From coffee to cocoa

Angela's story is the reality faced by farmers across Nicaragua – their once reliable and profitable coffee farms are no longer so. With climate change affecting communities like hers, Christian Aid is helping to find good alternatives.

Climate change is affecting weather patterns. If there is too much rain and not enough sun, coffee beans can suffer from fungal diseases. If there is not enough rain and too much sun, the coffee beans ripen too soon and become scorched. This unpredictable weather, combined with the falling price of coffee on the global markets, means that farmers who used to earn a good living now just about break even.

Farming communities across Nicaragua know that something needs to change, and they are looking to diversify their crops.

In the Jinotega area of Nicaragua, 200 coffee farmers have begun to grow cocoa. With support from Christian Aid partner Soppexcca, farmers are buying cocoa saplings and being

trained how to best plant and cultivate them. It takes about 3 years for the cocoa plants to be ready for harvesting, but with careful planning, preparation, and action now, farmers can work towards a brighter future for them and their families.

Your support for Christian Aid's climate work can help communities like Angela's. For 50 years, the Congregational Federation has sought to advance the Christian faith and has supported the work of Christian Aid as a Sponsoring Church. And as we look back and celebrate all that has been accomplished over those years, we must also look to the future. Through this Anniversary appeal, let us stand with our global neighbours to tackle this climate crisis for future generations.
